
In this short clip we highlighted a couple important factors that would prevent motor vehicle accidents in our community.



There are a few ways that we manage traffic control throughout the city. Enforcement (Summons) are one of the most important ways to reduce accidents. This can be anything from speeding enforcement to parking violations which cause line of sight issues at intersections. We also implement new city ordinances in certain problem areas, such as removing parking certain feet from intersections that cause visual obstructions to motorist as well as removing parking from one side of the street for roadways that are too narrow to allow two vehicles to pass through safely. Another way to help manage traffic control is to place regulatory signs (stop/yield signs) at intersections and make sure these signs are clear and visible. We also use a thermo plastic machine which lays down high visibility reflective white material for things such as crosswalks and stop bars. This brightens the intersection and pulls the drivers attention to the area at a greater distance.

LWhat can we do to reduce the number of crashes involving teens?

Even though there are already laws in place to help reduce teen driving accidents, more can be done. One such law that has been proposed is to have drivers under the age of 21 to have a mandatory 50 hours of practice driving before obtaining a license. In my opinion, one of the biggest causing factors for teen driving crashes is due to a lack of experience behind the wheel. The more practice and experience a new driver has, the less likely they will be involved in a motor vehicle crash. Another big causing factor of accidents is distracted driving/driver inattention. Everyone now has a cell phone on them while driving. Answering phone calls, text messages and all other applications take drivers eyes off of the roadway. If drivers are distracted, their perception reaction time is reduced to any potential hazards outside of the vehicle. We need to reduce distractions for all drivers.

Lin which areas are most prone to accidents involving young people and/or illegal and legal drugs?

As stated above, most of our accidents occur on our main roads throughout the city. This could be due to a higher volume of traffic that use these roadways on a daily basis. Accidents are also more likely to occur in the areas of town that have a higher population density. The more vehicles in a certain area, the more likely an accident will occur.
